# Going Wild...

Short days and long, chilly nights make it tough on our wildlife friends to find food and shelter. It's hard to hide when your favorite tree or shrub has no leaves. Seed-eating bird, looking for food on the ground, can be vulnerable to neighborhood cats, hawks and even owls.

You can help native birds by delaying maintenance on your landscape plants. Wait as long as possible to cut back your perennials like bougainvillea, ruellia, cassia and lantana. They're often loaded with fruit and seeds, and the leafless stems provide a valuable refuge for tiny songbirds. In addition, the frost damaged parts help insulate the plant from further cold weather damage.

To create a landscape

that attracts wildlife, provide their basic needs - food, water, and shelter.
Using desert adapted plants will ensure you attract native wildlife like Verdin, Lesser Goldfinch, Yellowrumped Warbler, Albert's Towhee, Curve-billed Thrasher, or even Western Bluebird, instead of city birds like pigeons.

Magazines are also available online — no more clutter!



# Home and Yard

New to the desert? Here are a few hints and tips for the spring and summer.

Check your sprinkler system for leaks, and salt build-up



or the need for replacement.

Palm trees aren't native to the Sonoran desert, which is surprising since there are so many of them in our area! The soil doesn't have the right nutrients, so feeding them is essential for optimum health. Palm food for desert climates is available at nurseries and Ace Hardware. Try quarterly feedings or using fertilizer spikes for continuous feeding for green, healthy palms without frizzle or burn. Make sure they are getting plenty of water too! To maintain the trees, remove dried leaf stalks. Try to avoid cutting green leaf stalks, as this can injure the plant. Trimming seed pods and flowering stalks will minimize tree litter near adjacent pools. Petioles or boots appear near the top of the tree. They protect the tree and help the fronds to develop naturally. When they are dried and ready to fall off, they can be removed easily — sometimes cutting a few stubborn fibers are necessary. Removing these too soon can stress and damage the tree. After removal, some consider the look of the tree more pleasing to the eye and glad that hiding places for spiders and scorpions are diminished.

Fruit matures on citrus trees in December, and may become overripe and fall off by late spring. It's important to keep fallen fruit picked up to avoid attracting nuisance animals. If you are considering planting an orange tree, make sure to select a variety with edible fruit. The majority of varieties have lots of seeds and are not sweet.

There are two grass seasons. In the fall, Bermuda grass is cut low and overseeded with cooler season fescue blends for fall through early spring. When the weather warms, cool season grass goes dormant and the desert-adapted Bermuda grass grows through.

Does it seem odd to plant petunias in September and tomatoes in January? Need to replace some plants in your yard, or just understand what they are? Some good resources include Desert Landscaping for Beginners (Arizona Master Gardners, book available through the library), Southwestern Landscaping with Native Plants (Phillips, book available through the library), Phoenix Gardening Calendar

(www.GardeningInArizona. com) and local nurseries. The plantstock from Treeland Nurseries is already adapted to our region, as one of their farms is near our neighborhood in Chandler. The nursery is located in Mesa.

# 40A Activities Update

Many families are enjoying the recently upgraded playground in the southwest area of our development. In addition, as-needed replacement of trees, as well as crabgrass remediation and replacement of gate signage are underway.

Parking on the streets is discouraged, and offenders are sent written violation notices with vehicles subject to towing. Signage will be placed near mailbox clusters as no-parking reminders, particularly in late evening to early morning times.



Speed in excess of the 25 mph limit on Mesquite Grove Way is a major cause of concern among neighbors, as well as dangerous driving in the Four Peaks cul-de-sac north of Leo. This cul-de-sac is at the end of a longer stretch of road and may not appear to be a dead end to those unfamiliar with the neighborhood.

The Board considered traffic calming measures, using input from residents, the City of Chandler, and the Chandler Police Department. Two measures are being implemented. The section of Mesquite Grove Way near the Leo entrance will become a school zone during the day, with signage indicating a new 15 mph speed limit. A dead end sign will be installed in advance of the Four Peaks cul-de-sac. We do not have enough data to support speed bump installation, and note a mixture of support and objections from residents.

Residents can have a major impact on the situation by observing the speed limit, communicating to teen drivers and guests, and working with the police department. Residents are asked to report incidents regarding more severe dangerous driving / property damage to a motor patrol officer (Chandler police department 480 782-4130 non-emergency), or use the Chandler police department's Frequent Patrol Request online form.

# Violations

Receiving a violation letter can be stressful, so remember the intent is to promote harmony within the community by guiding residents to conformance with the rules established by our CC&R's. Please read through the description of the situation, and go back to the CC&R's or contact the community manager to better understand the situation as needed, or communicate if the violation does not belong to the residence in question. Residents may contact the community manager to communicate remediation plans or completion, and defray additional neighbor concerns.

In most cases, people do not intend to violate the rules. However, if a situation is not remediated after several letters, legal proceedings may ensue. The best practice is to review the CC&R's, and contact the community manager for questions or clarification. Please remember that any modifications to external structures are subject to prior approval from the HOA Architectural Review Committee. For convenience, a listing of approved external paint schemes is on the website and paint books are available through the Architectural Review Committee Chairperson.

# Neighborhood Respect and Security

How do you think people feel about finding a pile of dog poo in their yards? Words such as disgusting, unfriendly, and disrespectful are sometimes used. Certainly, that is not the intention so please make sure to carry a bag



and cleanup after your dog even when no one appears to be looking. If it is inconvenient to pick up after your dog on a walk, consider training the dog to use your yard prior to walking in the neighborhood.

Although some barking is normal, please ensure that your pet does not bark for extended periods of time. Our property management company processes nuisance barking complaints, as well as the City of Chandler. For issues that are difficult to resolve, the City of Chandler offers free mediation services. For more information, contact the Neighborhood Programs staff at 480-782-4354 or email neighborhood.programs@chandleraz.gov.

Pranks that are unsettling to neighbors are not funny, and those that involve property damage are vandalism. The neighborhood speed limit is 25 mph, and 15 mph in the school zone near the Leo gate. Please be mindful of the speed limit on Mesquite Grove Way in particular. This street is less than 2/3 of a mile long, so speeding at 40 mph saves about 30 seconds and risks a lot more. Parents of young children have particular concerns regarding safety, so please be mindful of the speed limits and watch for children. # Home and Yard

New to the desert? Here are a few hints and tips for the fall.

In the fall, many lawns are overseeded with cool season grasses, as summer Bermuda grass goes dormant. T



as summer Bermuda grass goes dormant. The process includes scalping and dethatching lawns in early October. While it is still warm enough to germinate the seed, lawns are overseeded with winter grass, such as rye. Frequent, shallow watering will help the seed start, and the amount of water can be tapered off to 1-3 x per week as the winter grass establishes and the weather cools. When the weather warms next year, the Bermuda grass will wake from dormancy.



Palm trees aren't native to the Sonoran desert, which is surprising since there are so many of them in our area! The soil doesn't have the right nutrients, so feeding them is essential for optimum health.

This is a good time to replace plants in the yard as needed, and add soil amendments for a few months of growth prior to cooler winter temperature. The fall growing season supports many garden plants prior to winter freezes. It's a good time to make a plan for covering tropical plants to quard against winter freezes.
